Doss Receives Faith & Freedom Award from Interfaith Alliance

Chris H. Doss, Director of the Center for the Study of Law and the Church at Samford University's Cumberland School of Law, is the recipient of the first Walter Cronkite Faith and Freedom Award presented by The Interfaith Alliance. It recognizes his work as the court-appointed monitor in the DeKalb County, Ala., school prayer case.

Cronkite, the former CBS news anchor, presented the award April 9 during a ceremony at the Lotus Club in New York City. According to the Interfaith Alliance, the award honors an individual whose courageous actions have embodied the values of civility, tolerance, diversity and cooperation in the advancement of public dialogue and policy on traditionally controversial and divisive issues.

Doss, a Baptist minister who holds undergraduate and law degrees from Samford, was appointed by U.S. District Judge

Ira DeMent to monitor the enforcement of his October 1997 injunction placing restrictions on school-sponsored religious activities in DeKalb County.

Founded in 1994, The Interfaith Alliance involves people from more than 50 faith traditions who are committed to challenging those who manipulate religion to promote divisive and exclusionary political agendas.

Award committee members included Rev. Dr. Joan Brown Campbell, General Secretary of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA; former President Gerald R. Ford; U.S. Rep. John Lewis (D-Ga.); broadcast journalists Bill Moyers and Cokie Roberts; Andrew Young, chairman of Goodworks International, LLC., and Rev. Dr. C. Welton Gaddy, executive director of The Interfaith Alliance and its foundation. ■

Andrea Mitchell, Chief Foreign Affairs Correspondent for NBC News, will deliver the Samford University Commencement address during 10 a.m. exercises Saturday, May 22, at Birmingham-Jefferson Convention Complex Arena.

Baccalaureate services will be held Friday, May 21, at 8 p.m. in Wright Center. Dr. Rick Lance, Executive Director-Treasurer of the Alabama Baptist State Convention is the speaker. Baccalaureate follows a 5:30-7 p.m. reception for seniors and their families hosted by Samford President and Mrs. Thomas E. Corts in the Main Dining Hall.

Mitchell's extensive and varied reports for NBC and MSNBC include such major foreign policy issues as U.S.-China relations, the Hong Kong handover, the war in Bosnia, the Middle East peace process, conflict with Iraq, nuclear

proliferation in India and Pakistan and terrorism.

A native of New York City, Mitchell received a B.A. degree in English literature from the University of Pennsylvania where she currently serves as a trustee, a member of the executive committee and chairman of the Annenberg School Advisory Board. Mitchell is married to Federal Reserve Board Chairman Alan Greenspan and resides in Washington, D.C.

Judge James E. Hill, U.S. Court of Appeals, 11th Circuit in Jacksonville, Fla., will address graduates of Samford's Cumberland School of Law Saturday, May 22, at 3 p.m. in Wright Center.

Approximately 850 students will receive degrees during Commencement Weekend. ■

Student Scholars Share Research at NCUR

Samford University was represented by 53 students at the April 8-11 National Conference on Undergraduate Research [NCUR] at the University of Rochester.

Each student presented a research paper before an audience of academic peers during the meeting. Disciplines represented included the humanities, science, engineering, the arts, and professions such as nursing and pharmacy.

The Samford contingent represented one of the largest collegiate groups at the conference, according to Samford faculty coordinator Chris Metress (English).

Students were selected through a review process last fall, in competition with students

nationwide for the available spots on the program. Projects were undertaken mostly as part of senior-level seminars and honors courses.

Projects by Samford students included such varied topics as the effects playing violent video games have on aggressive behavior, Latino political participation in the U.S., and synthetic and redox studies of organometallic chemical compounds.

Along with Metress, Stephen Chew (Psychology), Randolph Horn (History & Political Science), Hugh Floyd (Sociology), Mary Ann Hocutt (Business) and Gretchen McDaniel (Nursing) accompanied the Samford students to NCUR. ■

Overby is a former Pulitzer Prize-winning editor in Jackson, Miss. He worked for 16 years as reporter, editor and corporate executive for the Gannett Company, the nation's largest newspaper company. He was vice president for news and communications for Gannett and served on the

management committees of Gannett and *USA TODAY*.

He was named president and CEO of the Gannett Foundation in 1989. The foundation was renamed the Freedom Forum in 1991, and he became chairman and CEO in 1997.

Overby will participate in a 1 p.m. panel discussion in the Center for the Healing Arts Room 112.

Other panelists are Jim Jacobson, former editor of the *Birmingham News*; Lee Davidson, editor of the *Auburn Plainsman*; and Holly Barnard, a media attorney with Johnson, Barton, Proctor and Powell. Media Day is sponsored by the Department of Journalism and Mass Communication. ■

SU Teacher Education Cited as "Extraordinary"

The Samford Department of Teacher Education was highly commended and earned reaccreditation from the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education's [NCATE] recent site visit.

The visiting committee identified 19 strengths of the Orlean Bullard Beeson School of Education and Professional Studies' program. Among the strengths listed by the NCATE committee were the department's continuous improvement processes, the widespread use of technology, the role of research in the program, the exit assessment model and the graduate educational leadership program.

According to Richard Dudley, chair of the NCATE committee, "As I read this list of 19 strengths, that's unheard of in my professional experience, now 11 years with NCATE . . . this is an extraordinary program . . . and you have a considerable number of things that are just simply outstanding."

Samford Provost James S. Netherton said, "The NCATE review is yet another validation of the high quality of Samford's Education program. For the past six or seven years the dean and the faculty have used the tools of total quality management to annually improve the program. The success of their efforts is now garnering both regional and national attention." ■
