# Cumberland Launches New Program, Degree

Beginning in fall 2000, Samford's Cumberland School of Law will offer a new program designed to give entering students a flexible schedule for completing their law degrees.

A limited number of students will be enrolled in the "flex" program, which allows them a maximum of five years to complete their studies. Students must take a minimum of eight credit hours each semester.

"This program is ideal for the non-traditional student," said Admissions Director Giselle Gauthier. "For example, a physician or other professional who wishes to maintain his or her practice will be able to do so while carrying a slightly reduced course load.

"We also expect this option to

appeal to parents of school-aged children, who will be able to attend law classes while their children are in school."

The law school also launches an LL.M./S.J.D. program in Law, Religion and Culture this fall, designed to attract aspiring and established legal scholars. ## Evans Named Judicial Fellow

Jill Evans, associate professor specializing in Torts and Environmental Law at Samford's Cumberland School of Law, has been selected as the 2000-01 Judicial Fellow assigned to the Federal Judicial Center in Washington.

The Judicial Fellows Program was created in 1973 by the late Chief Justice Warren E. Burger to provide promising individuals with a firsthand understanding of the federal government, in particular, the judicial branch.

Each year, fellows work with top officials in the judicial branch

of government. With assignments at the Supreme Court, the Federal Judicial Center, the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts and the U.S. Sentencing Commission, fellows have been involved in various projects examining the federal judicial process and seeking, proposing and implementing solutions to problems in the administration of justice.

As the fellow at the Federal Judicial Center, Evans will provide assistance with the center's research and history programs. Her fellowship begins September 5.

The Judicial Fellows are selected by a commission comprised of 13 members selected by the Chief Justice of the United States. ■

## Longtime Samford Professor Mabry Lunceford Dies at 80

Dr. William Mabry Lunceford, longtime professor of religion and philosophy, died July 21 in Birmingham. He was 80.

An ordained minister, Lunceford joined the Samford faculty in 1954. He served as chair of the Department of Religion and Philosophy from 1972

to 1980. Since 1994, he had been the Chapman Fellow for Pastoral Ministry in Beeson Divinity School, and he also served as interim director of the Samford Extension Division, in which he taught for many years.

A 1943 graduate in English from Samford, Dr. Lunceford held the Th.M. and Th.D. degrees in New Testament from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky. He also earned the master's degree in philosophy from the University of Alabama.

Just before joining the Samford faculty, Lunceford was

pastor of First Baptist Church, Guntersville. While a student at Samford, he served pastorates at Cedar Bluff, Gaylesville and Boligee. While a student in seminary, he served as pastor of Munfordville Baptist Church in Kentucky. He held a number of interim pastorates

during his years at Samford.

A charter member of Baptist Church of the Covenant in Birmingham, Lunceford is survived by his wife of 62 years, Mary Sue Thompson; a daughter, Susan Eagar of Denver, Colo., and a son Eugene Mabry Lunceford of Birmingham.

A memorial service was held in Reid Chapel July 24, and a graveside service and interment at Oakwood Cemetery in Lanett, Alabama the next day. ■

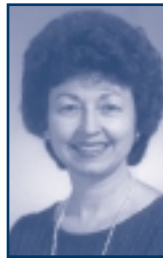
