Education Faculty Showcase Technology Projects

Faculty from Samford's Orlean Bullard Beeson School of Education and Professional Studies were among nearly 70 K-12 teachers and teacher educators who gathered in Birmingham to demonstrate innovative ways to use technology in the classroom.

The May 3 exhibition was sponsored by the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB) School of Education's Preparing Tomorrow's Urban Teachers to Use Technology (PT3) Program.

Thirty-five projects were conducted by participating classroom teachers from 11 area school districts in partnership with university and college teacher educators.

Samford participants included Carol Dean, David Finn, David Little, Michele Haralson, Raymond King, Josh Frantz and Becky Atkinson. Samford's Teacher Education Department demonstrated how to use electronic portfolios and WebQuests to enhance learning. Samford's presentation also focused on using technology in teaching children with disabilities. ■

Kuruk Wins Fulbright to Study in Germany

Professor Paul Kuruk of Samford's Cumberland School of Law received a Fulbright Senior Scholar Award for study this fall at the Max-Planck Institute for Foreign and International Patent, Copyright and Competition Law in Munich, Germany.

Kuruk is an expert in domestic and international law relating to intellectual property. He is extremely well-known in the field of intellectual property as it relates to traditional knowledge.

As a Fulbright Scholar, he will conduct a book-length research project and present lectures on problems and issues in current commercial uses of traditional knowledge and its protection. Traditional knowledge refers to the literary, artistic or scientific discoveries of community groups, including knowledge passed down through generations.

"The legal protection of traditional knowledge has emerged as an issue of global importance, propelled in large part by the increased interest of research scientists, pharmaceutical companies and other biotechnology

companies in the genetic resources of developing nations," said Kuruk.

There is a concern that traditional communities "are not adequately compensated for uses of their knowledge, and that any benefits they receive pale in comparison to the huge profits of western exploiters," he said.

Intellectual property law protects works of human creativity through patents, copyrights and trademarks, noted Kuruk, but such methods are not well-suited for protecting cultural works.

"Intellectual property law requires protected works to have

been written or recorded, and protection is generally granted for limited duration, as 20 years in the case of patents," he said. "Traditional knowledge cannot meet these criteria, because it is often passed orally through generations of people over the centuries and is therefore of unlimited duration." Kuruk currently participates in United Nations' efforts to develop policies in these areas.

Kuruk's research in Germany will offer recommendations for the adoption of a new framework of protection for traditional knowledge not based exclusively on intellectual property criteria.

Following his study, Kuruk will serve as visiting professor of law at Oxford University in England during the spring of 2003.

He is a member of the executive committee of the Association of American Law Schools section on Africa and a member of the American Bar Association section on intellectual property. He also serves as the secretary of the International Law Section of the Alabama State Bar Association. ■

Corts Discusses Accreditation During Syrian-U.S. Higher Education Talks

Samford University President Thomas E. Corts was one of 21 American educators who participated in the Syrian-U.S. Partnerships in Higher Education Conference May 15-16 in Damascus, Syria.

Dr. Corts traveled to the Middle East as part of the Consortium for Global Education. Members met with Syrian government and education officials for

discussions of higher education.

Corts spoke on accreditation in America. He is former president of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools regional accrediting agency.

"The Government of Syria has just opened the door to the possibility of private universities," Corts said. "Heretofore, all universities in Syria were government-sponsored. This

initiative has given rise to concern about how higher education is done in other parts of the world."

No accreditation system was necessary previously because whatever the government funded was approved, Corts said.

"Now, they are concerned that private universities meet some standards, and they are willing for public institutions to do likewise," he said.

Corts discussed how accreditation works in the U.S., "where government has no direct role, but only an indirect role by approving the accrediting agencies but not individual institutions."

The feeling is that "this is a significant way in which politics are kept out of the accreditation process," he added. ■

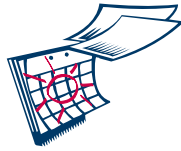
