Tom Woolley Receives Buchanan Teaching Award

Dr. Thomas W. Woolley, Jr., has been described as a professor who makes statistics come alive. That ability was recognized at Samford's semester-opening convocation Tuesday when Woolley received the Buchanan Award for Excellence in Classroom Teaching.

The award, with its \$1,000 check and silver tray, is based partially on nominations from last spring's senior class. Woolley was lauded as "always available," "enthusiastic" about his topic and its application, and as a teacher who "made learning meaningful" by some of his former students.

It is not Woolley's first teaching award. Two years ago, the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching chose him as Alabama's Professor of the Year. Ten years ago, when he was still on the UAB faculty, he received the President's Excellence in Teaching Award.

Woolley joined the Samford

School of Business faculty in 1993 after teaching at UAB and East Tennessee State. He has been involved in the Samford PBL initiative and served as professor-in-residence at Daniel House, the London Study Centre, during the spring of 2001.

Woolley holds B.S., M.S. and

Ph.D. degrees from Florida State University. He and his wife, Mary Lyn, have two children.

The annual teaching award honors the late John H. Buchanan, longtime pastor of Southside Baptist Church and Samford trustee for whom Buchanan Hall is named. ■

Alabama Awards Corts Doctorate

Samford President Thomas E. Corts received an honorary doctor of humane letters degree from the University of Alabama, citing his work "for educational integrity and constitutional reform."

The degree was conferred at Alabama's summer commencement Aug. 12, at which Dr. Corts was the speaker.

"Dr. Corts' work for educational integrity and constitutional reform demonstrates both the breadth of his vision and the depth of his concern for improving the quality of life available to all individuals," said Alabama Provost Nancy Barrett.

University of Alabama Interim President J. Barry Mason noted that Corts "worked to set and strengthen procedures for accreditation" as president of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. "The hallmark of his leadership is a passionate insistence on accountability," said Dr. Mason. ■

Samford To Offer Nurse Anesthesia Program; Fiedler Named Head

Samford's Ida V. Moffett School of Nursing will begin a nurse anesthesia program through its master of science in nursing degree during the summer of 2003.

Students completing the nurse anesthesia program will fulfill educational requirements to take the Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist [CRNA] examination.

Dr. Michael A. Fiedler, who has taught at UAB and Virginia Commonwealth University, will serve as chair of the Department

of Nurse Anesthesia in the nursing school. Fiedler has practiced as a CRNA at hospitals in Memphis, Tenn., Richmond, Va., and Houston, Texas.

He holds a B.S. degree from Indiana Wesleyan University, M.S. from Baylor College of Medicine Graduate School and Ph.D. from the University of Tennessee Health Science Center.

The new program will help meet a national CRNA shortage of 13.6 percent as documented recently by the National Center for Nursing. The shortage is more

severe in the Southeast and Southwest.

"The large number of health-care institutions in Alabama, Georgia, Tennessee, Florida and Mississippi creates an increased demand for nurse anesthetists as compared to other regions in the United States," said nursing Dean Nena F. Sanders.

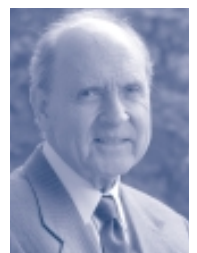
"Although we have not reached this degree of shortage in Alabama, a number of hospitals have delayed or canceled elective surgical cases due to the shortage

ABOUT BENEFITS

Family and Medical Leave More Generous than Required

The Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 requires employers of 50 or more employees to provide up to 12 workweeks of unpaid, job-protected leave to eligible employees for certain specified family and medical reasons.

But Samford's family and medical leave benefit is more generous than that. Samford not only complies with the law but gives up to six weeks of such leave *with pay* for employees with at least two years of continuous full-time Samford employment.

If employees need to remain on leave after six weeks of paid family and medical leave, they may use accrued sick, vacation and/or personal time to continue in a pay status.

An eligible employee must apply for such leave by completing a Family and Medical Leave of Absence Request Form, available in the Office of Human Resources. Reasons for such leaves, definitions of health conditions and procedures are contained in the policy that can be found at www.samford.edu/admin/humanres.

Library Adds E-books to Collection

The Samford library has had E-journals previously. This summer, it acquired access to E-books.

At netLibrary, some 300 publishers (including many academic and university presses) provide online access to more than 14,000 books. A user either can browse for quick research or reference (with a 15-minute time limit) or check out a book to read online or download.

To check out a book, a user must first create a netLibrary account. Books checked out are automatically returned at the end of the checkout period. Records for most of these books eventually will be added to the library's online catalog, having a call number followed by "eb."

Off-campus users can access the E-book collection if they use the netLibrary Web site from the library homepage or <http://library.samford.edu/netlib>. ■

of anesthesiologists," she said.

A National Institutes of Health study underscored the need, calling for a 40 percent increase in CRNAs by 2010.

Nurse anesthetist programs must be accredited by the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists [AANA]. Samford is working to develop its curriculum and establish clinical affiliations to submit accreditation materials by the winter of 2002-03. ■

in the Department of Religion.

Samford Sunday began in 1948 as "Howard College Day" to help aspiring young pastors prepare for the ministry. About 40 students take part in the program each fall and spring.
