on 300th Anniversary of His Birth Dec. 18

 \mathbf{A} new documentary on hymn writer Charles Wesley, AHeart Set Free, will premiere on cable and satellite television networks Dec. 18, the 300th anniversary of Wesley's birth. The documentary was produced by Samford Media Group, which is

affiliated with and has offices at Samford.

Wesley was one of history's most prolific hymn writers, composing more than 5,000 hymns over a 50-year period in the 18th century. Among the best known are "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today" and

"Hark! The Herald Angels Sing." He and his older brother, John, were cofounders of the Methodist movement in England. The sons of an Anglican minister, both studied at Christ Church Oxford, and were ordained as Anglican clergy. But Charles is chiefly remembered for his many

hymns. A Heart Set Free is the first production completed by Samford Media Group. It was produced and directed by veteran filmmaker T. N. Mohan, head of the Digital Video Center at Samford, and written by Angela Burchett.

The documentary will air globally on at least five cable and satellite television networks. One network, Hope Channel, will

show the feature around the globe in seven languages. Other networks carrying the program include Sky Angel, SafeTV and Cornerstone. Faith TV plans to carry the documentary later next year during Lent.

Mohan invested hundreds of hours filming the documentary in Great Britain and the United

States, traveling to Wesley's birthplace of Epworth, to Oxford and London to interview Wesley experts and to film sites.

Mohan has produced more than 20 award-winning fiction and documentary films including For One English Officer, the story of Samford graduate Gerow Hodges' successful efforts to gain the release of 149 Allied prisoners from German prison camps during World War II.

Charles Wesley Documentary to Premiere First Hanna Center Graduation Set for Saturday, Dec. 15

Samford will graduate about 279 seniors Saturday, Dec. 15, in the first commencement to be held in the new Pete Hanna Center. Another 64 seniors completed requirements in August, and some of those students may take part in the ceremony as well.

Dr. Paul A. Richardson, professor of music, will deliver the commencement address in his role as the current holder of the John H. Buchanan Award for Excellence in Classroom Teaching.

The ceremony will begin at 10 a.m. The President's Reception for seniors will follow the program, also in Pete Hanna Center

Samford's Air Force ROTC unit will have its commissioning ceremony Friday at 4 p.m. in Hodges Chapel. The School of Business will hold its hooding ceremony for master's degree recipients Saturday, Dec. 15, at 7:30 a.m. in Brock Forum.

Davenport Credits Students for Helping Him Achieve Professor of Year Award

When Dr. Larry Davenport was named 2007 Alabama Professor of the Year in November, he was quick to share the honor with those who helped him attain it.

"I thank all the good folks who nominated me," he said. "But mainly I thank my many years of Samford students, who have always pushed me to excel and who share this award with me."

Davenport was chosen for the prestigious honor by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education, who sponsor the national program.

He was one of 40 educators selected for the honor out of a field of 300 nationwide.

The recognition cited not only his teaching but also his conservation work in Alabama. Suzanne Wolfe, editor of Alabama Heritage

magazine, noted that the biology professor's extensive research on the Cahaba Lily and its fragile habitat "brought national attention to Alabama's unique natural resources and led directly to the creation in 2002 of the Cahaba River National Wildlife Refuge, a 3,000-acre site in Bibb County."

Davenport has taught at Samford since 1985. Earlier this year, he took on additional duties as director of the Vulcan Materials Center for Environmental Stewardship and Education.

He is the fourth Samford faculty member to be named Alabama Professor of the Year since the early 1990s. The other recipients were business professors Marlene Reed (now retired) and Thomas Woolley, and psychology professor Stephen Chew.
