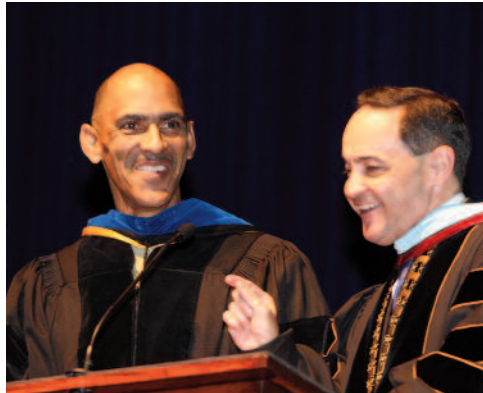
## Samford Upbeat as 2010-11 Starts

Samford began its 170th year with about 840 new students and a total enrollment of about 4,700 students. President Andrew Westmoreland was upbeat about the beginning.

"My confidence level is as strong as it has ever been," he told faculty and staff in his annual pre-school message Aug. 23. "So many good things are going on that I'm convinced that this will be a good year, and that it will be the first of many good years."

In addition to the strong enrollment, which could top last fall's record of 4,658 students, Samford this summer completed a near-record year in giving with more than \$21 million in contributions despite a faltering economy. That was second only to the school's all-time record year of \$23 million in 2009.

Current strengths, said Westmoreland, include a positive

net operating margin and strong academic attributes with a "solidly grounded" liberal arts program, and great graduate and professional programs "that we need to celebrate."

In the rankings race, Samford climbed 12 spots to 104th among the nation's 262 national doctoral research universities, according to *U.S. News & World Report*. Samford was tied with Florida State, Howard University, and the universities of Nebraska, New Hampshire and Tennessee. ■

## O'Day to Give Holley-Hull Lectures

Dr. Gail R. O'Day, the new dean of the Wake Forest University School of Divinity, will deliver the 2010 Holley-Hull Lectures at Samford Sept. 8-9. Formerly professor of New Testament and preaching at Emory University, she assumed the Wake Forest deanship Aug. 1.

Dr. O'Day's research focuses on the Gospel of John, the Bible and preaching, and the history of biblical interpretation. She is a

graduate of Brown University with a master of theological studies from Harvard Divinity School and a doctorate in New Testament from Emory.

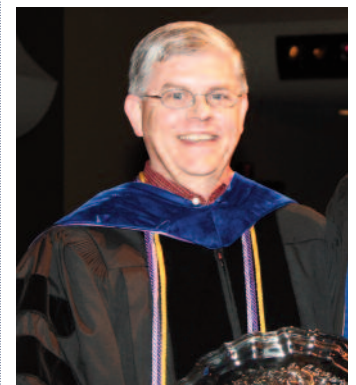

Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellow Eleanor Clift of *Newsweek* magazine will present a free public lecture at Samford Wednesday, Sept. 22, at 6:30 p.m. in Brock Recital Hall. Her topic will be "Women in Politics: From Suffrage to Shattering the Glass Ceiling."

Clift, a *Newsweek* contributing editor, writes about the Washington power structure, the influence of women in politics and other issues. Formerly the magazine's White House correspondent, she also served as congressional and political correspondent, and as deputy Washington bureau chief. Her column, "Capitol Letter," is posted each Friday on [Newsweek.com](http://Newsweek.com).

The Samford program is presented by the Francis Marlin Mann Center and its Andrew Gerow Hodges Lecture in Ethics and Leadership. Clift will be in residence at Samford as a Wilson Fellow Sept. 19-24. She will speak in classes, and meet with groups of students and faculty. ■
