## Davies, Author of *Cracking the Genome*, To Deliver Davis Lecture Oct. 14

Dr. Kevin Davies, the British science writer and author of several books on the human genome, will deliver the annual J. Roderick Davis Lecture Thursday, Oct. 14, in Wright Center.

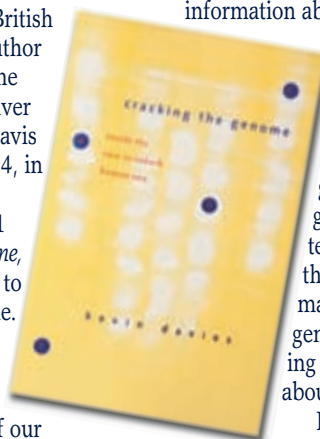
Davis wrote the 2001 book, *Cracking the Genome*, which chronicled efforts to complete the genetic code. The book explored the history of what Davis described as the "greatest scientific discovery of our time," as well as the personalities involved, and the prospects and pitfalls of genetic research based on knowing the genetic code.

The founder of the genetics research journal, *Nature Genetics*, Davies recently published *The \$1,000 Genome*, a book that explores the remarkable growth of personal genomics, which enables consumers to learn

information about their health risks and ancestry from their own DNA and the emergence of next-generation technologies that soon will make human genome sequencing routine for about \$1,000.

Davies studied biochemistry at St. Peter's College, Oxford University, and earned his Ph.D. in genetics from the University of London before moving to the United States to pursue further research. He holds postdoctoral fellowships in Boston at the Whitehead Institute and Harvard Medical School.

## Samford Has Record Enrollment—Again

Samford's record enrollment of 4,715 students can be attributed to several factors, according to Phil Kimrey, vice president for student affairs and enrollment management:

- A big increase in Ida V. Moffett School of Nursing graduate enrollment, from 183 to 263 students
- An increase in freshman-to-sophomore retention, from 82.2 to 86.1 percent
- A record 1,777 in overall graduate enrollment, up from 1,750 last fall

- An entering class of 840 new students, 712 freshmen and 128 transfers

Samford enjoyed its second consecutive record enrollment. Last year's 4,658 was the previous high.

The academic profile of the 2010 freshman class is the strongest in history, Dr. Kimrey added, with an average Scholastic Aptitude Test [SAT] score of 1149 and an ACT college entrance examination score of 26. Both are above the national average. The freshman class also includes 13 National Merit Scholars. ■

## Clift Sees No Pelosi Effect

That so many women are "getting in the arena, being engaged and mattering" during this campaign year would make the early suffragists proud, political writer and commentator Eleanor Clift told a Samford audience Sept. 22.

The presence of viable women candidates in many gubernatorial and U.S. senate races around the nation is a far cry from the early suffragists' struggles described by Clift in her talk, "Women in Politics: From Suffrage to Shattering the Glass Ceiling."

Even after women voted for the first time in 1920, Clift said, it was assumed for a long time that they would vote like their husbands, or that their vote would simply cancel out their spouse's. Things began to change with the "gender gap" in 1980 and the "year of the woman" in 1992, when the first major influx of women, mostly Democrats, won elections.

This year's label, "the Palin effect," reflects the endorsements

## Dean Sanders Honored As Visionary Leader by UAB

Dr. Nena F. Sanders, dean of Samford's Ida V. Moffett School of Nursing, has been named one of 60 Visionary Leaders in a program that celebrates the 60th anniversary of the UAB School of Nursing.

Sanders and the other leaders will be recognized at an Oct. 22 luncheon. UAB established the awards "to celebrate the school's renowned graduates and their mark on nursing," said UAB nursing dean Doreen Harper.

Sanders earned her bachelor, master and doctor of science in nursing degrees from UAB.

"Nena Sanders' selection as a visionary health-care leader is a reflection of the visionary leadership she has brought to Ida V. Moffett School of Nursing at Samford," said Samford Provost and Executive Vice President J. Bradley Creed. "Under her guidance and direction, the nursing program has experienced tremendous growth and quality

improvement in its academic offerings."

Sanders, who has been active in nursing, nurse education and administration for more than 30 years, joined Samford in 1999 and was named dean in 2001. She has provided leadership in establishing a nurse anesthesia program and a doctor of nursing practice degree program. This fall, Samford has 638 nursing students enrolled including 263 graduate students—both all-time highs. ■

that former Alaska governor and 2008 Republican vice presidential candidate Sarah Palin has given to female candidates, said Clift, a longtime observer and writer about the Washington power structure and the influence of women in politics.

Clift's lecture was part of the continuing series of A. Gerow Hodges Lectures in Ethics and Leadership hosted by Samford's Frances Marlin Mann Center for Ethics and Leadership.

Clift was at Samford Sept. 20–22 as a Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellow, a program of the Council of Independent Colleges.

A contributing editor of *Newsweek* magazine since 1994, Clift appears as a regular panelist on the syndicated talk show, *The McLaughlin Group*. Her column, "Capitol Letter," is posted each Friday on Newsweek.com. Her books include *Founding Sisters and the 19th Amendment* and *Madam President: Shattering the Last Glass Ceiling*.

Dubbed "Mama Grizzlies," the Palin-endorsed campaign hopefuls include Delaware senate contender Christine O'Donnell. "She looks like a young version of Palin, and the media is taken with her," Clift said of O'Donnell, adding that although some parts of her history make Republicans uneasy about her, "They need Delaware."

Republicans also have female nominees in senate races in New Hampshire, Connecticut, California and Nevada. GOP contenders for governorships are headlined by California's Meg Whitman, who has spent \$129

million of her own money in the race against Democrat Jerry Brown, said Clift.

There is no doubting Palin's impact, said Clift, who finds no comparable "queen or king maker" on the Democratic side and sees Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi as too controversial for that role. "I don't see a Pelosi effect," said Clift.

Former Democrat presidential candidate Hilary Clinton is off the playing field as an endorser because of her position as Secretary of State, though Clift notes that Clinton is getting rave reviews for her diplomatic work, including her attempts to bring peace to the Middle East.

One future scenario involving Clinton, said Clift, has President Barack Obama switching roles for her and vice president Joe Biden. Given that a president likes to set up his successor through the vice presidency, such an arrangement would position Clinton for that to happen.

"It's something to think about," said Clift, noting Biden's previous service as chair of the senate Foreign Relations Committee and the fact that he "would love to be secretary of state." And while Clift said she doubts that Clinton would ever challenge Obama, "I think she still wants to be president."

The nation won't know until election day what effect Palin's endorsements will have on voters, said Clift. "But we're seeing her influence shaping the field. It is interesting to see her turn every deficit to her advantage." ■

Also, his article, "Acknowledging Experience: Pork Chop Hill and the Geography of the Korean War," has been accepted for publication in the journal, *War, Literature, and the Arts*. ■

Howard College of Arts and Sciences Dean David Chapman noted that "many people are concerned about the future of genetic research," adding, "Although we are excited about the possibility of curing diseases and correcting genetic defects, we are also fearful of genetic engineering that seems to be tampering with nature." This year's Davis Lecture "will be an opportunity to discuss all these questions, and consider their physical and moral implications," he said. ■
