Samford Story: Big Enrollment, Full Residence Halls, Busy Schedule

Samford opened its 170th academic year with another big enrollment, a full house and a fall schedule filled with a variety of events.

Samford has almost 850 new students on campus, according to Dr. Phil Kimrey, vice president for student affairs and enrollment management. These include about 693 freshmen, 123 transfers and 30 Chinese language students.

Preliminary figures indicate that Samford's enrollment will top last year's record 4,715, although the official figure will not be finalized until the close of business Friday, Sept. 16.

Samford has a record 2,015 students residing on campus, said Lauren Taylor, director of campus life and university services. One reason for the record is the addition of 56 beds in the renovated Pittman Hall, bringing its capacity to 155. The residence halls are filled, said Taylor.

Braxton Delivers Holley-Hull

The Rev. Dr. Brad Braxton, an ordained Baptist minister, biblical scholar and author, will deliver the Holley-Hull Lectures at Samford this month. He will present three lectures Sept. 28-29 on the theme "The Beloved Community in a Pluralistic World."

Dr. Braxton holds a Ph.D in New Testament studies from Emory University. He is a member of a team of scholars who have created The African American Lectionary, the first

online ecumenical African American preaching and worship lectionary, which is funded by the Lilly Endowment.

The Rhodes Scholar and author of three books and numerous essays has taught at Vanderbilt and Wake Forest universities.

Don Bogen, award-winning author of four books of poetry, will lead off this year's Samford Visiting Writers series Wednesday, Sept. 7, at 7 p.m. in N302 Divinity Hall. Bogen spent last spring at the Seamus Heaney Poetry Centre of Queen's University, Belfast, as Fulbright Distinguished Scholar in Creative Writing.

Winner of the Emily Dickinson Award of the Poetry Society of America, he is Nathaniel Ropes Professor of English and Comparative Literature at the University of Cincinnati.

- Nov. 7, **Jane Hirshfield**, author of six collections of poetry. Her collection, *After*, was named a Best Book of 2006 by the *Washington Post*, *San Francisco Chronicle* and *London Financial Times*.
- Feb. 13, **Michael Kardos**, author of a story collection, two books and other short stories. He codirects the creative writing program at Mississippi State University. ■
