COURSE DESCRIPTION

Classics 200, *The Rediscovery of the Classical World*, is an "exploration of the world of the Ancient Greeks and Romans. This course examines multiple aspects of Classical Antiquity through the eyes of those who rediscovered it in literary texts, in works of art and architecture, and in its material remains. It provides a broad and well-illustrated introduction to the history, literature, religion, and art and architecture of the Greeks and Romans."

An A on an assignment or as a course grade represents the highest achievement. A student who earns an A has consistently submitted excellent work and achieved a high level of scholarship in all regards; no further substantial improvements could have been made. A B on an assignment or as a course grade represents achievement of a high but second order. A student who earns a B has completed good work of an above-average nature, but did not achieve the highest level of scholarship.

A C on an assignment or as a course grade represents achievement at an average level. C-level work meets the requirements of the individual assignment or the course, but does not go beyond normal expectations. A D on an assignment or as a course grade represents a performance that falls below average expectations. D-level work in most cases did not meet the requirements of the individual assignment or the course. An F on an assignment or as a course grade represents a failing performance.

* It is each student's duty always to be aware of the grade that he or she is earning in this class, and to take full responsibility for it. Your grades are not kept secret from you; they are always available for your inspection.

CLASS POLICIES

Attendance and Participation

This course is based in part on class discussion and student participation. It is essential that each student attend every class and, having done the assigned reading, be ready and able to participate. Only absences due to illness (with appropriate documentation) or approved University activities will be excused.

For a MWF class, more than six unexcused absences over the course of the semester will result in a failing grade in the course.

Each day we meet you are evaluated on your participation during that class period. These individual grades form the basis for the overall participation grade in the class. While actively listening and paying close attention are always required and are certainly highly valued, you are also expected to verbally participate (when it is appropriate!) in discussion with your instructor and your colleagues.

Classroom Etiquette

Your demeanor in the classroom also influences your participation grade. You are expected to be on time for class and stay the entire period. Common (but essential!) rules of courtesy always apply. Only one person talks at a time. Our class meetings are not the place for naps, extracurricular reading or drawing, working on assignments for other classes, personal grooming, or personal conversations. Cell phones, pagers, CD players, personal satellite systems, etc., etc., must be turned off while you are in class. **If one of these electronic devices goes off during the class period, the owner of the offending machine loses all participation points for that week.**

You are required especially to show the proper respect to your colleagues while you are in this class. While there may be differences of opinion from time to time, during class discussions, these disagreements occur only on the intellectual level, and no personal comments or attacks will be tolerated.

You may be asked to leave the class if:

- you are sleeping.
- you are working on or reading material other than what we as a class are considering at that point in time.
- you engage in behavior that is distracting or offensive to your colleagues.

- it becomes obvious that you have not done the reading and are not prepared to discuss the material assigned for that day.

Assignments

Assignments are due on the dates listed on the course schedule. **Late assignments will not be accepted.** No assignment may be submitted by email; all work must be handed in, printed out, in person. Be sure to keep an extra hard copy of all the work that you submit in this course.

* Every effort will be made to return graded assignments in a timely manner. In most cases assignments will be returned one to two weeks after they were submitted.

Make-up Policy

Class participation grades are not eligible for any kind of make-up exercise. (If the absence is an excused one, you will not be penalized for losing those participation points.)

In the case of a missed quiz or exam, a make-up will be given only in the case of an **excused** absence, and with prior notification. There are no exceptions to this policy.

All make-ups will be given Tuesday, May 10.

Students will not be permitted to reschedule the final exam.
