2. ACADEMIC INFORMATION

2.1 DEGREES OFFERED

The Division of Music of Samford University offers post-baccalaureate study leading to the following graduate degrees:

- Master of Music (M.M.) in Church Music
- **Master of Music** (M.M.): in Instrumental Performance
- **Master of Music** (M.M.) in Piano Performance and Pedagogy
- Master of Music (M.M.): in Vocal Performance
- **Master of Music Education** (M.M.E.)* Traditional Program
 Applicants should hold initial teaching certification in music (the equivalent of an Alabama Class B).
- Master of Music Education (M.M.E.)* Alternative Master's Program Applicants should hold a Bachelor of Music (B.M.) degree, or an equivalent degree from an institution accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music. An applicant whose undergraduate preparation does not meet these specifications may be admitted provisionally, with the requirement that course work stipulated at the time of admission be completed to ensure that preparation is equivalent to that of a graduate of the Bachelor of Music degree program offered by Samford's music division.
- **Special Graduate Status**: Non-Degree Primary goals of students not seeking degrees are re-certification or continuing education in their professional fields.

2.2 ACCREDITATION

Samford University is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) to award associate, baccalaureate, masters, education specialist, and doctorate degrees. Degree-granting institutions also may offer credentials such as certificates and diplomas at approved degree levels. 3. ADMISSION

3.1 ADMISSION PROCEDURES

The application for admission to the graduate music program is located at https://graduateadmission.samford.edu/apply online. Unconditional admission to any program requires a grade-point average of 3.0 or above. International applicants must contact the Coordinator of Graduate Studies in Music for additional procedures.

3.2 ENGLISH/TOEFL REQUIREMENTS

The School of the Arts Graduate Programs do not require any English proficiencies for U.S. citizens and naturalized U.S. citizens. All international students with undergraduate degrees from outside of the U.S. are expected to meet one of the following Samford University English requirements:

IELTS: 6.5 or aboveDuolingo: 120 or above

3.3 AUDITION/INTERVIEW

In addition to the application materials, each applicant must audition and/or interview for the appropriate music performance faculty. Graduate audition dates are listed on the application at https://graduateadmission.samford.edu/apply online. Recorded auditions are acceptable in extenuating circumstances contingent upon prior approval. Prospective students should submit applications at least two weeks prior to a particular audition weekend to better ensure audition availability.

3.4 AREA AUDITION REQUIREMENTS

Audition requirements vary by degree. Please consult https://www.samford.edu/arts/music/graduate-degrees to locate degree-specific pages containing detailed information about audition requirements.

Master of Music in Church Music Audition Requirements

In addition to the standard application material, Church Music applicants must submit the following materials according to the concentration in which they intend to apply:

Additional Application Materials

Conducting Concentration: a ten to fifteen-minute video recording of the student conducting a rehearsal or performance.

Performance Concentration: a repertoire list indicating literature performed in the applied performance area (keyboard, voice, instrumental).

Thesis Concentration: a writing sample of a research paper no fewer than ten pages in length.

On-Site Audition Requirements

Conducting Concentration:

- 1. On-site conducting of a choral piece selected by conducting and church music faculty.
- 2. Sight reading melodies and rhythms.
- 3. Performance of two pieces of contrasting style in student's designated performance area (keyboard, voice, instrumental).
- 4. Interview with Church Music faculty.

Performance Concentration:

- 1. Prepared performance of 15 minutes in length of pieces in a contrasting style in student's applied area (keyboard, voice, instrumental).
- 2. Interview with Church Music faculty.

Thesis Concentration:

- 1. Prepared performance of 15 minutes in length of pieces in a contrasting style in student's applied area (keyboard, voice, instrumental).
- 2. Interview with Church Music faculty.

Master of Music in Music Education: Traditional Requirements

- 1. A cover letter requesting admission to the MME program.
- 2. A copy of a valid teaching certificate (Initial Licensure)
- 3. Official transcripts from institutions attended since high school
- 4. Three (3) letters of recommendation
- 5. Satisfactory Dispositions Assessment
- 6. A teaching video and lesson plan (15-20 minutes in length) that demonstrates instructional skills and represents understanding of rehearsal/classroom instruction. Internship videos may be used
- 7. An interview with the music education faculty.

Master of Music in Music Education: Non-Traditional Requirements

- 1. A cover letter requesting admission to the MME program.
- 2. Official transcripts from institutions attended since high school
- 3. A Bachelor of Music (BM) or equivalent degree from an institution accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM) is required.
 - a. Undergraduate GPA must be at least 2.75, with a cohort average of 3.0
 - i. If the undergraduate GPA is 3.0 or higher, no testing is required.
 - ii. If the undergraduate GPA is lower than 3.0 the applicant must submit:
 - 1. Praxis Core Reading score of at least 156
 - 2. Praxis Core Writing score of at least 162
 - 3. Praxis Core Math score of at least 150
- 4. Three (3) letters of recommendation
- 5. Satisfactory Dispositions Assessment
- 6. An interview with the music education faculty.

Master of Music in Vocal Performance: Audition Requirements

- 1. Five (5) memorized, contrasting selections including:
 - a. English
 - b. German
 - c. Italian
 - d. French

Prospective students wishing to be considered for the Opera Birmingham Studio should present at least two (2) arias at the audition, with an additional three (3) selections of either art songs or arias. Prospective students who are not interested in the Opera Birmingham Studio should present at least one (1) aria or oratorio piece at the audition, with an additional four (4) selections of either art songs or arias.

4. SCHOLARSHIPS AND ASSISTANTSHIP DUTIES

4.1 SCHOLARSHIPS

The Division of Music offers scholarships each year on the basis of student achievement and department needs. Full-time enrollment is required to receive tuition assistance. Assistance may be tied to responsibilities including ensembles, academic assistance, and relevant administrative work. Based upon the evaluations by faculty and the Coordinator of Graduate Studies in Music, tuition assistance can be renewed for a maximum total of two years for each degree earned. Below is a graph that shows the required work hours per semester based on the student's financial award:

5. MATRICULATION

5.1 PLACEMENT EXAMINATIONS

All admitted graduate students in music will be given placement examinations in musicology and music theory prior to registration for classes. Students in Vocal Performance will also take a diction examination. These examinations cover the range of courses in these areas that are contained in a typical Bachelor of Music degree program. They are designed to evaluate the student's mastery of this material as a foundation for graduate study. Required remediation in deficient areas must be completed prior to commencement of some academic graduate-level courses, earning the minimum grade of C-. Course of study will be confirmed with the advisor for the specific area of study.

5.2 GRADUATE STUDENT ORIENTATION

New student orientation is offered the week before classes begin each Fall semester. All new students are encouraged to attend. The goal of orientation is to better facilitate the transition to graduate school by introducing new students to the values, expectations, and resources of the Samford community. At orientation, students will finalize course schedules, identify key members of the Samford community, and learn about student resources.

5.3 ENROLLMENT

All graduate programs in the Division of Music may be undertaken on a full-time or part-time basis. The university recognizes six (6) credits as the minimum full-time load in these programs. A candidate may withdraw at any time. This should be done in writing to the Coordinator of Graduate Studies in Music, with reasons stated. Should a former student wish to resume candidacy, he or she should contact the Coordinator of Graduate Studies, who will, in consultation with the faculty of the Division of Music, determine if resumption is a possibility and what this would entail.

6. SPECIAL STATUS

6.1 SPECIAL GRADUATE STATUS

Students wishing to enroll for graduate credit but not to seek degree candidacy may file an application for special graduate student status by submitting college transcripts and the Application for Graduate Studies in Music. Applicants accepted to this status may register for graduate credit in any course offered by the Division of Music, subject to permission of the area faculty upon examination of transcript, audition in an applied area, and/or the administration of the placement examinations normally given to entering degree-seeking graduate students. No credit earned while in this status may be applied toward any Master's degree offered by the Division of Music.

7. GENERAL INFORMATION

7.1 TRANSFER CREDIT

If approved by the Coordinator of Graduate Studies in Music upon consultation with the faculty and the Associate Dean for Music, as many as twelve of the credits required for a Master's degree in the Division of Music may be transferred from other institutions. Transfer courses must have been completed within the six-year period prior to receipt of degree.

7.2 PROBATION

No graduate course in which the grade earned is below B- may be counted toward the degree. A candidate must maintain a grade-point average of 3.0 (on a 4-point scale) to remain in good standing. Should the candidate's grade-point average fall below this standard, the candidate may be placed on probation for one semester to provide an opportunity to raise the average to 3.0. If this average is not achieved, the candidate is automatically withdrawn from the program.

7.3 CULMINATING EVENTS

Application for Graduation. Candidates for the M.M. and M.M.E. degrees must complete an Intent to Graduate Form which can be found here: https://www.samford.edu/departments/registrar/graduation Please refer to the Registrar's Office webpage for deadlines and application instructions.

Oral Comprehensive Examination. Candidates complete an oral comprehensive examination during the final semester of study, (MME Non-Traditional students may elect to take this exam a semester before student teaching). This examination is designed to measure candidate knowledge acquired during their studies and to evaluate their ability to integrate and apply this knowledge to professional practice. Exams are scheduled during weeks seven (7) to ten (10) of the student's final semester. The examination committee is chaired by the Coordinator of Graduate Studies in Music and consists of three (3) or more faculty members which are selected by the Graduate Studies in Music Committee.

In the semester prior to the oral comprehensive exam:

- 1. Obtain a copy of the Oral Comprehensive Examination form: https://www.samford.edu/arts/music/student-resources
- 2. Communicate with committee members to discuss examination content and expectations.
 - a. Obtain the initials of each committee member on the Oral Comprehensive Examination form.
- 3. Submit their completed Oral Comprehensive Examination form to the Coordinator of Graduate Studies in Music.

The Oral Comprehensive Examination has three (3) components:

1. Music selections

Candidates must select three (3) compositions in conjunction with their major professor and/or program area director. Selections should represent the area(s) of the candidate's study. Candidates may expect to answer questions related to these selections. Candidates in Instrumental Performance, Vocal Performance, Piano Performance and Pedagogy, and Music Education programs must choose three (3) compositions of contrasting styles. Candidates in the Church Music program must choose one work from the principal performance area, one congregational song, and one choral work. PDF files of the scores should be submitted to the Coordinator of Graduate Studies in Music and the committee via email no later than two (2) weeks prior to the scheduled examination.

2. Knowledge in the major field and professional practice

Candidates should consult with professors in the major field and their oral exam committee for preparation purposes.

3. General musical knowledge

This portion of the exam includes a brief overview of musical knowledge not limited to the candidate's major field.

NOTE: No outside materials aside from the selected compositions are permitted in the oral comprehensive examination.

Unsatisfactory Completion of the Oral Comprehensive Examination. Candidates demonstrating weakness in a particular area may require the satisfactory completion of a separate written assignment and/or a second oral comprehensive examination at least two (2) weeks prior to graduation.

7.4 TIME LIMIT

Candidates have six (6) calendar years from the time of initial enrollment in the graduate program to complete the degree. Under extenuating circumstances, candidates may apply for a one-year extension.

7.5 FACULTY AND ADMINISTRATIVE SUPERVISION

The Coordinator of Graduate Studies in Music serves as an advisor for students in all graduate degree programs. In this role, the Coordinator oversees the application process, monitors the satisfaction of requirements stipulated at the time of admission, offers counsel for professional development, oversees assignments of graduate examination committees, schedules comprehensive examinations, and certifies the eligibility of candidates for graduation. Graduate students should consult with program area directors for academic advising and coursework-related questions.

It is the responsibility of candidates to ensure that all requirements are satisfied. Toward this end, consultation with the Coordinator of Graduate Studies in Music and other faculty members is encouraged. Faculty and staff are not, however responsible for candidate progression in any program. It is strongly advised for accuracy of records that all inquiries and requests be made in writing.

Policies and procedures for all graduate programs are approved by the faculty of the Division of Music and carried out by the Graduate Studies in Music Committee. The Committee is chaired by the Coordinator of Graduate Studies in Music, who is appointed by the Dean of the School of the Arts. Requests for exceptions to the provisions of the catalog and/or this manual should be directed to the faculty of the Division of Music through the Coordinator of Graduate Studies. In the case of discrepancy between the Graduate Music Manual and the Samford University Graduate Manual, the Samford University Graduate Manual shall be considered authoritative and correct.
