#### DEADLINE FOR COURSE REVIEWS

Deadlines for Jan term and spring courses are approaching! When your course is ready for review, please notify your department chair and the instructional designer assigned to your course.

Term Start	Review Submission Deadline
January 2 & 3, 2019	November 28, 2018
January 22, 2019	December 17, 2018

# The Canvas Corner

#### **Known Issues**

As courses are migrated from Moodle to Canvas, there will be "clean-up" required. Below you will find the top known issues that occur when moving or copying content between Moodle and Canvas courses. Click the solutions below to learn more! If you have any trouble implementing the solution identified, please contact <code>samfordonline@samford.edu</code>.

**Issue 1:** After importing content into a Canvas course, the Home page changes to show the Modules rather than the original Front page from the blueprint.

**Solution:** The Home page will need to be changed back to the Front page included in the blueprint. *Click Here for details.* 

**Issue 2:** Copied course content is placed below the existing blank modules, making it appear as though the content did not transfer.

**Solution:** Delete unused modules. *Click Here for details.* 

Issue 3: Kaltura Videos do not copy over with course content from Moodle to Canvas. Furthermore, Kaltura will be discontinued after December 31, 2018.

Solution: All Kaltura media content has been copied into Canvas's Arc media library. Instructors will need to use Arc to reinsert their media content into their course.

**Issue 4:** Files attached to an assignment activity in Moodle will not be attached to the assignment in Canvas.

**Solution:** The file does get copied into Canvas, but will need to be re-linked to the assignment. *Click Here for details.* 

#### The Canvas Commons

Canvas Commons is a learning object repository that enables faculty to find, import, and share resources. A digital library full of educational content, Commons allows Canvas users to share learning resources with other users as well as import learning resources into a Canvas course. To import objects from Commons:

- Enter your course
- Click the "Import From Commons" button on the right side of your screen
- Search for the content or select the shared tab for your group content
- Select your course on the right
- Then click "Import into Course"

## Training for the Updated QM Rubric

The QM Higher Education Rubric, Sixth Edition Update (Rubric Update) course is available to all QM Higher

Education Members. QM role-holders such as Peer Reviewers and Master Reviewers are required to successfully complete the Rubric Update to retain their role. The Rubric Update will be available for free until December 31, 2018. After December 31, 2018, the Rubric Update will become the Rubric Update Role Reinstatement course and will cost \$50 to take. - 1. The QM Higher Education Rubric, Sixth Edition, and how it differs from the QM Higher Education Rubric, Fifth Edition.

3. Changes that have been made to the Course Review Management System that will go into effect along with the QM Higher Education Rubric, Sixth Edition.

## Spiritual Growth Modules in Canvas

You may have noticed the sounds of construction equipment echoing across initiative is now becoming a reality. As a campus. Much of this is an effort to enhance the student experience and provide physical spaces for community building among on-ground students. These spaces will soon be filled with students hanging out together, praying together, and talking about what God is doing in their lives. While the rattle of jackhammers and excavators is not as evident for virtual spaces, Samford is just as committed to providing students.

Samford's mission to "nurture persons in the development of faith and personhood" extends to all students including online students. In 2016, the Samford Online Task Force identified one of its initiatives as "The exploration of a spiritual formation component available to all online students and aligned with Samford's mission."

Through the Canvas Commons, this result of a collaboration with the Office of Online and Professional Studies and the Office of Spiritual Life, we are excited to extend spiritual growth opportunities and virtual community spaces to our online students through the Canvas Commons.

Starting in January, a series of spiritual formation modules, which can be imported into an instructor's course with the click of a button, will be intentional community spaces for online available in the Canvas Commons. Each module is fully developed and centered around a theme (Faith and Vocation, Workplace Integrity, Loving your Neighbor, A Christian's Response to Social Justice, etc.) with the following components:

- Scripture passage and a short devotional (written by faculty and staff at Samford)
- Brief video and/or podcast

pertaining to the theme of the module with personal reflection questions

 A group discussion with questions prompting students to connect their major or coursework to the module's theme

Participation in these modules is voluntary and how they are utilized in the classroom is dependent upon each instructor. They are designed to be resources for instructors to provide online spiritual growth and community building opportunities at the course level.
