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Nominate Alumni for Annual Awards





Nursing Faculty Member to Travel to Africa

School of Nursing instructor Amber Patrick will travel to Zambia, Africa June 15-July 1 to work with Luyando.org. As a part of a 14 person team, Patrick will be devoted to medical outreach in

the mornings, meeting the physical needs of the people of the Simukale village. In the afternoons she will join the rest of the team in kids Bible clubs, building the village's first

orphanage, and distributing food through the established feeding club. Patrick sponsored a child through Luyando and will get to meet her for the first time while on this trip.

In Her Words: Amber Patrick, alumnus and nursing instructor

Meet Matron, my sponsor child. Our journey to each other is nothing short of God's divine sovereignty. Three years ago I was walking a dirt trail in the hills of Blantyre, Malawi - a small country in the middle of nowhere Africa - heading toward a "hut" house to tell a family the Good News of Jesus Christ. I knew this family would have never seen a blonde girl with such fair skin before, would have never heard of America, and would have never heard the name Jesus prior to this. I knew this because of the four families and the school of around 100 students I had just spoken to. They all stared at me in awe - panic, maybe at first - but sheer awe. Not at me, exactly, but at the news I brought to them. The Hope.

As I walked between house four and five, I turned to one of my translators who worked with the ministry staff (e3 partners) to ask him where he was from because I knew he wasn't from the area. He

said Zambia. He asked me where I was from in return. I said Alabama, never dreaming he'd have a clue where I was referring to. He asked me if I knew someone named Kelsey Weeks from Birmingham. Right then and there, in the middle of the hills of Malawi, Africa, my path crossed with one of the Zambian locals that Kelsey founded Luyando with, Pastor Wilfred Kapapa. Only God could orchestrate something so perfect.

I met him, and heard about her, and came to realize that my sister actually already knew Kelsey too. And that I might pray diligently about sponsoring a sweet baby girl in the sponsorship program until finally I felt such a tug on my heart when I saw Matron's picture that I knew it had to be her. It was as if the Lord had saved her especially for me. This summer I have the chance to travel to Zambia to not only serve as a

nurse in meeting the physical needs of the Simukale people, but also telling them about Jesus, and getting to meet my sweet Matron girl for the first time.

This is more than just a trip. It's going to change my life forever - I know. He already has, she already has. Can't wait to update everyone when I get back.

Amber Patrick received her BSN in 2010 and her MSN in 2013 from the Ida V. Moffett School of Nursing. She is an instructor in the undergraduate program.

Faculty Integral in AL-HAC Initiatives to Address Health Care Challenges

The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) announced that the Alabama Health Action Coalition (AL-HAC) is one of 30 state coalitions to receive grant funding as part of the *Future of Nursing State Implementation Program (SIP)*. The program is helping states prepare the nursing profession to address our nation's most pressing health care challenges—access, quality and cost.

AL-HAC was established in late 2012 and is part of the [*Future of Nursing: Campaign for Action*](#). Ida V. Moffett School of Nursing associate professor, Dr. Carol Ratcliffe and dean Nena F. Sanders were founding members of the AL-HAC organization. Ratcliffe currently serves as co-leader for the organization. Associate dean for graduate programs, Dr. Jane Martin is a member of the organization's 80 x 20 Taskforce. The nursing lead partner of the AL-HAC is the Alabama Organization of Nursing Executives (AlaONE) and the other lead partner is Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Alabama (BCBSAL). Other partners of record are the Alabama Hospital Association (AlaHA), the

Medical Association for the State of Alabama (MASA), and AARP Alabama.

The State Implementation Program (SIP) bolsters efforts already underway in 50 states and the District of Columbia—the *Future of Nursing: Campaign for Action*—to improve health and health care through nursing. A joint initiative of AARP and RWJF, the *Campaign* is working to implement the Institute of Medicine's (IOM) evidence-based recommendations on the future of nursing. It provides a vehicle for nurses at all levels to lead system change to improve care for patients and families through collaboration with business, consumer, and other health professional organizations.

Grant recipients for the SIP will implement programs that prepare nurses to lead system change, strengthen nursing education, expand access to care by maximizing the use of nurses, recruit and train a more diverse nursing workforce, and improve quality and coordination of health care. The Center to Champion

Nursing in America (CCNA)—an initiative of AARP, the AARP Foundation, and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation—serves as the national program office for the *Future of Nursing State Implementation Program*.

When official news of the SIP grants was made public by the RWJF, the partners of the AL-HAC were ecstatic. "The diverse leadership and partnership of the Alabama Health Action Coalition and our focus on meaningful outcomes that improve care were key factors in Alabama being selected," Ratcliffe said. "We are part of a powerful movement that is improving health care for all Americans. The Alabama Health Action Coalition is grateful to RWJF for this support, which will strengthen our work immeasurably."


