

A TRIBUTE TO DR. GEORGE KELLER

We honor the long-time AGS leader.

SHORTLY AFTER OUR AGS SESSION THIS YEAR, THE

AGS community learned the sad news that our long-time leader, director of AGS from 2001 to 2023, had left us.

George Ernest Keller III passed away at his home in Birmingham, Alabama on the morning of Saturday, August 23rd after a four-year battle with cancer.

He was born on May 24th, 1960, in Bellefonte, Pennsylvania. Soon after, his family moved to Charleston, West Virginia, where he spent the majority of his childhood. He graduated from South Charleston High School in the spring of 1978. He attended Centre College in Danville, Kentucky, where he graduated in 1982 with a B.S. in Biology. He then went on to receive his Ph.D. in Biology from West Virginia University. Bud moved to Birmingham as a postdoctoral fellow at the University of Alabama at Birmingham in 1991.

Dr. Keller spent the rest of his life in Birmingham after meeting his spouse, Cindy, at Independent Presbyterian Church (IPC). There he began his career at Samford University, where he served as a professor of biology for more than 30 years. Throughout his career at Samford, he served as Assistant Dean of Arts and Sciences, as well as the Director for the Alabama Governor's School for close to two decades. He was an active member of his church, where he served as elder and deacon, participated in multiple committees, and also sang bass in his beloved choir.

Dr. Keller's impact touched every aspect of the program, as he recruited faculty, secured speakers for evening seminars, and planned Mandatory Fun and other activities for each year's school. He administered the nomination, application and selection processes that resulted in a unique mix of outstanding students from across the state each year.

Dr. Keller introduced new courses and revised favorites as student interest and technology changed. During the two weeks of the program, Dr. Keller was known for his extensive wardrobe of Governor's School t-shirts. Over the years, he saved the t-shirt from each Alabama Governor's School program, while also collecting t-shirts from Governor's School programs from other states. Prior to his service as director of the program, Dr. Keller taught the Research Science Class.

We asked two colleagues and esteemed members of the AGS family, Dr. Carolyn Satterfield and Dr. Jeanna Westmoreland, to pen their thoughts and tributes to Dr. Keller. We present them here as a remembrance to what he meant to the program.

From the AGS family to George's: Please know that he leaves a legacy of unmatched passion and excellence that impacted the lives of hundreds of AGS students. As the entire AGS family of leaders, alumni and supporters know, AGS wouldn't be here today without him

YOU COULD ALWAYS COUNT ON DR. KELLER. SAMFORD

University Biology Professor and Director of the Alabama Governor's School. For some two plus decades George and I worked closely together each year to create an exceptional two week learning and growing experience for the AGS students at Samford University.

We had Deans of schools teaching classes along with outstanding faculty from SU, UAB, and the private sector. George saw to the details of the corporate dinner at Vulcan Museum, the etiquette challenge, service project day, team competitions, and daily buses were ready so that events ran smoothly. Even when he was hit by that awful cancer, he was there to serve. We are pleased that the AGS continues to be a one-of-a-kind program for Alabama academically excellent high school students.

It is with sincere gratitude that I recall the man whom I, nor the Governor's School, could have done without, Dr. George Keller!

conveyed to students that everything was under control. Even after a semester on-leave after his cancer diagnosis, Dr. Keller's calming presence reassured students attending AGS 2022—the first program after COVID disrupted plans for the 2020 and 2021 AGS programs.

In addition to his service to the Alabama Governor's School, Dr. Keller was an active member of the National Conference of Governor's Schools, "the leading voice in supporting the development and growth of summer residential governor's school programs." During his tenure as AGS director, he hosted the annual meeting of the organization in Birmingham.

Dr. Keller's influence lives on in the structure of the program, many of the courses offered and in the core principles and values that are the foundation of the program. That influence is affirmed as we continue to have many second generation AGS students attend each year.



music, requires a deepunderstanding of processes, structure, and principles of the law. At the beginning of the seminar, the AGS students of the Legal class review the fundamental documents that helped establish our country, such as the Constitution, the Bill of Rights and other key amendments.

The seminar is taught by Judge Karon Bowdre. She hopes these students will learn to think for themselves on difficult legal issues, and how to conduct civil discourse. Lively discussions allow students to debate and ask questions.

Topics of conversation vary from anything from past history to the newest and latest news topics.

Some topics included "The

Right of the President to Send the National Guard to Los Angeles" and "Transgender Care for Minors". AGS students also delve deeply into how the legal system works.

The class learned the elements of a trial, what incarcerated life is like, and programs the government does, and does not, provide for people who are rejoining society.

Guest speakers visit the group and share experiences in their chosen fields of law. This year the class heard from Birch Bowdre, who talked to them about corporate law and estate planning and MaryLou Bowdre, who is an assistant United States Attorney in Montgomery.

During the second week of the program, students took a field trip to the United States Courthouse here

in Birmingham. They got to view actual cases in progress, and hear the court's sentencing. Their time in the courtroom allowed the students to see, in reality, many of the procedures they have discussed in their seminar.

Students this year remarked that they "Didn't know that is was going to be so interesting, and that the seminar was "informative", and how the seminar piqued their interest

persuing a legal career.

At the start of the seminar students are presented with a fictional case and then split into a prosecuting side and a defense side. Throughout the seminar they must set aside time to collaborate with their peers inside and out of class and prepare a strong arguments for their side of this designated case. The teams were coached by John West and Omega

Adams who were former stars in the Cumberland National mock trial teams.

The mock trial happens during last class session. Through experiencing the mock trial and throughout the whole two week seminar students get an idea of what it looks like to work in the legal sytem.

These experiences allow students to take many new ideas back to their own high school.



air, the students of AGS's Sky's the Limit class watch from the ground below. This is one of the many activities in which the students of this class participated. Scott Settle, who has taught with AGS for 4 years, brought his students to various places across the Birmingham area, including flight history museums, and airfields, while showing them the beauty of flight.

One of the first places the students visited was the RC airfield, where they flew model RC planes. After this first experience, students were very excited for the last day, when they would be able to fly these planes without any safety measures, and be able to demonstrate the skills they learned. Students also visited the Shelby County Airport and its flight school. While there, they watched planes take off and land. They also talked to mechanics and instructors who answered their questions as they examined both experimental and trainer aircraft.

While there, students also visited the National Weather Service station. Talking to a meteorologist, the students learned how the NWS is able to forcast weather events, what they do in the event of bad weather, and how their mission is assisted with the use of aircraft.

The students also visited the Southern Museum of Flight, and saw historical and military planes. As a final stop, the group visited a special hanger where the students got to learn about repairing and maintaining planes.

Sky's the Limit class has shown these students the inner workings of flight, not so much the engineering side, but more of the repair and flight side. Aden Brinkman concisely put it, ""[In general], the class has shown a lot about the opportunities from one end to the other end of aviation."





THE MEDEA SEMINAR, LED BY DR. RANDY TODD, WAS an exciting and enriching experience for AGS students. In this afternoon seminar, students read and analyzed the story of Medea, exploring such themes as justice, morality, ethics and more.

Dr. Todd emphasized how he just wanted the class to try to understand the characters and then form their own opinions about the story, rather than fully analyze the plot and the writings of Euripides. Themes like good vs. evil and innocence vs. guilty prompted students to really consider what makes a person labeled a certain way.



TALKING ABOUT nursing and medicine is something you typically would think of when you see the words "health professions", and in this class a nursing career is something you definitely might consider when deciding which route to go with getting your college degree. In this class we walked through the ins and outs of many different health professions and their various aspects. Even when you're not actively learning something, the instructors were always up and moving around. They would talk to students and share their experiences, and how to be successful with these career choices.

From talking about kinematics, anatomy, physical therapy, physicians assistant, speech/language pathology, and interprofessional

simulations. On Monday the class was introduced to physical therapy/ anatomy. They learned parts of the legs and how the muscles shorten and extend when moving. Then students were asked to practice these skills by determining and replicating the exercises shown. Proceeding to next class they were taught about physical training and how being in shape will indicate how well you perform different physcial activities. From bench pressing to pushing lightup buttons for reaction time, every skill that is potentially beneficial could improve your playing time.

In the next class session we got the opportunity to learn what physicians' assistants do. We reviewed Dr. Johnson's career and how important surgeons are in the medical field.





Dr. Johnson showed us how to stitch incisions. tie knots with a string, which is helpful in surgery, because if you are able to stitch or staple properly, then being able to tie a knot around the artery/liver, etc. can be life saving. learned how to spell our names in vowel language, and was able to see various tools used for communication. These activities were fun to learn, especially testing everyones' hearing in our class.


