

The Israeli military said there had been a "security incident" with militants of the Iranianbacked Lebanese Shia group, while Hezbollah denied it had engaged in clashes.







## When families are shut out of facilities

#### Nursing home rules heighten anxiety

Her 103-year-old mother is in a nursing home where several staff members are out sick with the coronavirus.

His 73-year-old wife is recovering from a broken hip in the rehab section of another nursing home, where almost two dozen patients in a different wing have tested positive — and some have died.

The two Brevard County residents join countless families worried about parents, spouses and friends in nursing homes or assisted living facilities during the state's current COVID-19 surge — and who, because of lockdowns since March 14, can't assess their loved ones' condition or care in person.

Their concern is understandable.

As of Saturday, ... fatalities in long-term care facilities statewide account for 45.7% of Florida's 5,777 coronavirus deaths.

According to Friday's Department of Health update, 25 patient deaths have been connected to long-term care facilities in Brevard – 39% of the county's 64 deaths as of that date. As of Saturday, the 2,445 fatalities in long-term care facilities statewide account for 45.7% of Florida's 5,777 coronavirus deaths.

In a DOH report, as of July 23, Brevard had a total of 182 patients who'd tested positive at 15 different facilities and 174 staff members testing positive at 38 facilities.


