CREATING DRAMA // FOR HEARING

Try a video like "**The Waiting**" by Work of the People [<u>www.theworkofthepeople.com</u>] Let it serve as a way to encounter scripture and reflect on its themes.

Lectio divina is an ancient Christian practice that invites us to hear the scripture passage multiple times for the purpose of reflection. Use it this week to hear scripture. We've created a leader's script using Lectio divina for Luke 1:68-79.

Leader Script // Luke 1:68-79 // Lectio Divina

To reflect on our scripture passage, we will use Lectio divina, an ancient Christian practice that invites us to hear the scripture passage multiple times for the purpose of refection. As you prepare to hear the scripture passage, get into a comfortable position, close your eyes, and listen to the whole passage as a unit. I'll leave a few moments of silence after each reading. On the second reading, begin to listen for a word or group of words that shimmer or draw you in. On the third reading, allow yourself to focus on a word or group of words, then begin to think about what God might be wanting to say to you through those group of words.

A reading from the gospel of Luke.

Close your eyes and listen to the passage and take in the passage as a whole unit. Begin to listen for a phrase or particular part of the passage that stands out to you.

"Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has visited and redeemed his people and has raised up a horn of salvation for us in the house of his servant David, as he spoke by the mouth of his holy prophets from of old, that we should be saved from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us; to show the mercy promised to our fathers and to remember his holy covenant, the oath that he swore to our father Abraham, to grant us that we, being delivered from the hand of our enemies, might serve him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before him all our days. And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways, to give knowledge of salvation to his people in the forgiveness of their sins, because of the tender mercy of our God, whereby the sunrise shall visit us[a] from on high to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace."

Provide a few moments of silence, then say:

A reading from the gospel of Luke.

Begin to listen for a word or group of words that shimmer or draw you in.

"Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has visited and redeemed his people and has raised up a horn of salvation for us in the house of his servant David, as he spoke by the mouth of his holy prophets from of old, that we should be saved from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us; to show the mercy promised to our fathers and to remember his holy covenant, the oath that he swore to our father Abraham, to grant us that we, being delivered from the hand of our enemies, might serve him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before him all our days. And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways, to give knowledge of salvation to his people in the forgiveness of their sins, because of the tender mercy of our God, whereby the sunrise shall visit us[a] from on high to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace."

Provide a few moments of silence, then say:

A reading from the gospel of Luke.

Allow yourself to focus on the word or words that stood out to you. Thank about what that might mean to you right now, in your present circumstance. What is God saying to you through them?

"Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has visited and redeemed his people and has raised up a horn of salvation for us in the house of his servant David, as he spoke by the mouth of his holy prophets from of old, that we should be saved from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us; to show the mercy promised to our fathers and to remember his holy covenant, the oath that he swore to our father Abraham, to grant us that we, being delivered from the hand of our enemies, might serve him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before him all our days. And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways, to give knowledge of salvation to his people in the forgiveness of their sins, because of the tender mercy of our God, whereby the sunrise shall visit us[a] from on high to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace."

Invite worshipers to share with their neighbor what God might be saying to them through the scripture passage. Conclude by singing a song that relates to the scripture passage.

FINDING ART // FOR SEEING

Find art that uses prominently the deep purple to further connect the themes of Advent to visual sign. We like these works by Julie Quinn.





LIVING WORSHIP // FOR DOING

MAKING SPACE // FOR WORSHIPING

Deep purple and royal blue are colors of the Advent season. This week, have this color spread throughout the worship space.

WRITING POETRY// FOR PRAYING

As a way of praying, put worshipers in small groups and ask them to reflect on the question, "What are you preparing for?" After each person shares, invite them to write prayers asking God to keep them mindful of making room for Christ in their preparations. You might end this time by voicing a prayer of preparation such as this one from our friends in the Presbyterian Church.

LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT WREATH

Use the song below to gather. Between the song and the Call to Worship, remind worshipers the significance of the Advent wreath and its role in worship this month. Then, light the second candle of the wreath.

GATHERING SONG

SCRIPTURE READING

Luke 1:68-79

Use our online resource to treat this scripture reading as a *lectio divina*. This will give worshipers the chance to hear the scripture and reflect on it.

MESSAGE

TIME OF RESPONSE

After each person shares, invite them to write prayers asking God to keep them mindful of making room for Christ in their preparations.
