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MAKING SPACE // FOR PRAYER

◆ **Collect for Days of Trouble**

2 Corinthians 12:7-10; Matthew 16:24-25; Psalm 80

Renewing, restoring, and reviving God, we know that you give the gentle rains and warm sun, and all that we need to grow healthy and strong. And while our heads tell us that your grace is made perfect in our weakness, our hearts feel only the frailty of a failing world. So Lord, come! Come down, come in, come with us, and make us whole. Our troubles and weaknesses leave our souls barren; sickness and grief leave our hearts in pain; war and violence leave our world in conflict; homelessness and inequality leave many feeling abandoned; and the poor and starving remind us that oppression reigns rampant. Help us receive the faith you offer, Jesus—the faith that is different, the faith that is dangerously compelling, the faith that carries a cross and says, “When I’m weak, then I’m strong.” And though your children wander far from home, root us once again in the warmth of love. TAKING TIME // TO LAMENT

1. **CRY OUT TO GOD.**

Biblical lament is more than internal grieving. It is crying out to an almighty, merciful, loving God.

2. **NAME YOUR PAIN.**

Reflect over the losses and grief you've experienced during the past year, and name them in prayer.

3. **MAKE YOUR REQUESTS KNOWN TO GOD.**

Express your heart's desires to God. In the Psalms, many times these requests sound demanding. "Please, God, help me!"

4. **EXPRESS YOUR TRUST IN GOD.**

A cry to Almighty God with faith results in hope for the future. While things are not now as they should be, those who trust in God know better days lie ahead.

CREATING SPOKEN WORD // FOR HEARING

A Tableaux Representing the 126th Psalm

Image 1: Worshipful joy.

Actor 2 bows down to the ground in a state of worship. Actor 3 stands beside her/him one arm outstretched in worship, gazing to the sky joyfully with other hand on top of head in a state of wonderment (this position is open to change/interpretation).

Actor 1:

When the Lord changed Zion's circumstances for the better, it was like we had been dreaming. Our mouths were suddenly filled with laughter; our tongues were filled with joyful shouts. It was even said, at that time, among the nations, "The Lord has done great things for them!"

Image 2: A gardener sows his seeds.

Actor 3, The Farmer, kneels down to the ground and digs his/her fingers into the ground for sowing while Actor 1, The Lord, places a gentle hand on his/her shoulder, guiding the farmer and overlooking the bounty that will surely come to harvest.

Actor 2

Yes, the Lord has done great things for us, and we are overjoyed. Lord, change our circumstances for the better, like dry streams in the desert waste! Let those who plant with tears reap the harvest with joyful shouts.

Image 3: Rejoicing!

Actor 1 and Actor 2, back-to-back. Actor 1 assumes a position of anxiety while Actor 2 assumes a position of praise showing the dichotomy of waiting to be delivered and being delivered.

Actor 3

Let those who go out, crying and carrying their seed, come home with joyful shouts, carrying bales of grain!

Beat.

This is the word of the Lord.

Actor 1 and Actor 2 turn out to join Actor 3.

A Responsive Reading Based on Psalm 22:

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from my cries of anguish? My God, I cry out by day, but you do not answer, by night, but I find no rest.

[Allow time to name individual losses, pain, sorrows and lamentations before the Lord and one another. Consider such griefs from the past year as sickness

and death of friends and loved ones, social injustice and unrest, job and financial stress, loss of what once was normal, etc.]

You are enthroned as the Holy One; you are the one Israel praises. In you our ancestors put their trust; they trusted and you delivered them. To you they cried out and were saved; in you they trusted and were not put to shame.

Lord, be not far from me. You are my strength; come quickly to help me. I will declare your name to my people; in the assembly I will praise you.

You who fear the Lord, praise him! All you descendants of Jacob, honor him! Revere him, all you descendants of Israel.

For he has not despised or scorned the suffering of the afflicted one; he has not hidden his face from him, but has listened to his cry for help.
